Moreland City Council has put its Proposed 2018-19 Budget out for community feedback.





This year Council will continue to invest in community infrastructure and services

Below is a snapshot of some of the investment proposed

	\$11.3 million Upgrading and maintaining 633 kms of local roads.
	\$2.2 million Upgrading and maintaining 1,052 kms of footpaths and 56 kms of shared paths.
	\$1.2 million Building new bicycle infrastructure
	\$1.6 million Maintaining parks, open space and streetscapes
	\$8.5 million Completing the Oak Park Sports and Aquatic Precinct. Council has already invested \$18.5 million in this redevelopment, which is Moreland's largest ever capital works project.
	\$500,000 Continuing two hard waste collections per year
	\$400,000 Reducing carbon emissions through innovative solar and energy efficiency programs.
	\$400,000 Upgrading five playgrounds
	\$500,000 Maintaining and upgrading Moreland's pools and leisure centres.

Increasing investment

Investment in infrastructure has increased since the last budget

 83%	New footpaths and bike paths
 64%	Renewing footpaths and bike paths
 31%	Building upgrades and renewals
 30%	Investment in bridges
 10%	Road upgrades and renewals

Managing waste

Following China's policy change on accepting recyclable waste from other countries, Moreland, along with councils all over Australia, is facing a rise in costs to continue its kerbside recycling service.

This means, for example, the annual waste charge in Moreland for a household with an 80 litre bin will increase by approximately \$20 this financial year.
